Buffalo History Museum

An inspired group of history makers founded The Buffalo History Museum (TBHM), then called the Buffalo Historical Society, in 1862. They assembled a unique collection of regional paintings, photographs, artifacts, and manuscripts to share with researchers and the public. To accommodate the organization's rapid growth, more space was needed.

An ideal opportunity for a new, larger space presented itself during planning for the great exposition at the turn of the 19th century. Buffalo architect George Cary designed the New York State Building for the 1901 Pan-American Exposition. It was designed to be reused as a permanent home for the museum.

From handwritten business ledgers to innovations marking industries, from folders of neighborhood photos to complete soldier's footlockers, today more than 100,000 physical objects and over 200,000 photographs and 20,000 books mark time and in combination shape our understanding of Western New York's story. Westward expansion, industrialization, immigration, transportation, Presidential, military and social history – these themes tie us to our nation's story.

The museum houses major collections pertaining to the Holland Land Company, U.S. President Millard Fillmore, Seneca Indians, Buffalo Bills, the Pan-American Exposition, the Larkin Company, and much more.

The Buffalo Transportation Pierce-Arrow Museum was established in 1997. The Museum building, at the corner of Seneca Street and Michigan Avenue, in downtown Buffalo (once a Mack Truck dealership and showroom), opened in 2001.

Jim Sandoro and his wife, Mary Ann, have spent more than 45 years collecting memorabilia, antique vehicles and historic artifacts to visually display the rich transportation history of Western New York. They welcome you to the Museum to see the impressive collection of automobiles, bicycles, motorcycles, Pierce-Arrow artifacts,

Jello Wagon, Corvette collection, the 1927 Buffalo Filling Station by Frank Lloyd Wright, and much more.

Frank Lloyd Wright's Martin House Complex

Frank Lloyd Wright (1867-1959) designed a unique residential complex for wealthy Buffalo businessman Darwin D. Martin and his family between 1903-1905. The most substantial and highly developed of Frank Lloyd Wright's Prairie houses in the Eastern United States, The Darwin D. Martin House received National Historic Landmark status in 1986. The house is considered by leading Frank Lloyd Wright scholars as one of Wright's finest achievements of the Prairie period and, indeed, of his entire career. The complex consists of six interconnected buildings designed as a unified composition, including; the main Martin House and a pergola that connects it to a conservatory and carriage house with chauffeur's quarters and stables, the Barton House, a smaller residence for Martin's sister and brother-in-law, and a gardener's cottage added in 1909. The landscape design for the grounds of the complex I highly integrated with the overall composition of buildings.

The Martin House is a prime example of Frank Lloyd Wright's Prairie House ideal, with strong horizontal lines and planes, deeply overhanging eaves, a central hearth, prominent foundation, and a sheltering, cantilevered roof. The complex contains 394 examples of Frank Lloyd Wright-designed art glass, including the famed "Tree of Life" window.

The Buffalo and Erie County Naval & Military Park is a museum on the shore of Lake Erie in Buffalo, New York. It is home to several decommissioned US Naval vessels, including the Cleveland-class cruiser USS Little Rock, the Fletcher-class destroyer USS The Sullivans, and the submarine USS Croaker. Old Fort Niagara

The history of Old Fort Niagara spans more than 300 years. During the colonial wars in North America, a fort at the mouth of the Niagara River was vital, for it controlled access to the Great Lakes and the westward route to the heartland of the continent. With the completion of the Erie Canal in 1825, however, the strategic value of Fort Niagara diminished. It nonetheless remained an active military post well into the 20th century.

The three flags flown daily above the parade grounds symbolize the nations which have held Fort Niagara. Each competed for support of a fourth nation: the powerful Iroquois Confederacy. The French established the first post here, Fort Conti, in 1679. It's successor, Fort Denonville (1687-88) was equally short lived. In 1726 France finally erected a permanent fortification with the construction of the impressive "French Castle." Britain gained control of Fort Niagara in 1759, during the French & Indian War, after a nineteen-day siege. The British held the post throughout the American Revolution but were forced, by treaty, to yield it to the United States in 1796. Fort Niagara was recaptured by the British in 1813. It was ceded to the United States a second time in 1815 at the end of the War of 1812.

This was Fort Niagara's last armed conflict, and it thereafter served as a peaceful border post. The garrison expanded beyond the walls following the Civil War. Fort Niagara was a barracks and training station for American soldiers throughout both World Wars. The last army units were withdrawn in 1963. Today, the U.S. Coast Guard represents the only military presence on the site.

The Albright-Knox is committed to maximizing the economic and social impact of the museum as a vibrant hub where people of all walks of life can connect with art, ideas, and one another.

In 1836, the Young Men's Association (YMA) was founded in the City of Buffalo. As the center for organized cultural activities in the city, the YMA's committees dealt with the public library, science, literature, and art. In most small towns, the public library is the recipient of all manner of curiosities and interesting objects; consequently, the YMA became the proud owner of numerous specimens, minerals, fossils, shells, insects, pressed plants, sea weeds and various paintings and articles of historic value. The acquisition of these specimens called for a cabinet for their display – thus began the collection that would lead to the Buffalo Museum of Science we have today.

Since 2010, the museum has been on an aggressive path to renovate all of the permanent exhibits, including the National Geographic 3D Cinema, culminating this transformation was the restoration and reopening of the rooftop Kellogg observatory in July 2018.

Designed by iconic landscape architect Frederick Law Olmstead, Niagara Falls State Park is the nation's oldest state park, with lush scenery, fabulous hikes and views that capture the original splendor that awaited the first visitors to the region.
